First year student nurses' experience with death and dying of a patient in clinical



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Introduction

- Nursing training in South Africa is composed of two components
- Student nurses are expected to do practical work in the clinical area
- Allocation of nurses in clinical area commences from first year
- Clinical nurses are expected to teach these new nurses



<u>Purpose</u>

The purpose of this study was to explore experiences of first year student nurses when dealing with death and dying of a patient in order to understand their feelings and emotions they go through.

Objective

 Explore and describe experiences of first year student nurses when dealing with death and dying of patients.

<u>Methodology</u>

- Qualitative method was used
- Population (First year students nurses)
- Data collection (In-depth interviews)
- Data analysis (thematic data analysis)
- Ethical considerations
- ✓ Study approval, informed consent, privacy, protection of identity

Data collection

- How did you experience dealing with death and a dying patient during your clinical allocation?
- The following were probing questions:
- ✓ How many encounters of dealing with death and dying of a patient did you have?
- √ What was the second and subsequent encounters like?

Findings

The following themes were developed from data analysed:

- Lack of knowledge
- Emotional trauma
- Not belonging

Lack of knowledge

- ✓ "I didn't know the signs of a person who is gasping or who is dying and I didn't even know what gasping is. I just relied on rumours that I once heard, that a dead person feels 'cold'
- ✓ "We didn't even know that the patient has passed away as we just continue to bath him".
- √ "I had no knowledge of how to handle a dying patient. Sisters just shut us out when we ask things".

Discussion cont...

Emotional trauma

- ✓ "The patient was a child. The mother visited and brought some fruits for the child, only to find that the child is no more alive".
- ✓ "I was stressed as I could not cry; I was told that
 nurses are not supposed to cry".
- √ "It was very hard. I could not sleep. I moved out of nurses home so that I can always be with my mother".



Discussion cont...

Not belonging

- ✓ "I feel that I do not belong to this profession. If I do belong,
 then why is it that two patients two patients died in my care?"
- ✓ "I did not even perform procedure such as resuscitation to save a patient's life because I did not know such procedure. Had I known this procedure, I would have saved this patient's life. Now I feel that I do not belong in this profession as I cannot save life".
- ✓ "I actually wanted to quit the course because I felt that I do not belong"

Recommendations

- First year nurses need to be accompanied by tutors when going to the clinical areas.
- Clinical facilitators needs more training on how to introduce new nurses to the situations.
- Reduction of theory load to make space for practical.
- Change of attitudes of the clinical to make student nurses feel acceptable to the profession.
- Nursing students to have debriefing sessions especially after a traumatic experiences.
